

### Vālmīki asked Nārada



### Nārada said


There is one, descended in the line of Ikṣāku, and known by the name of RAMA

He was a image of love.


He was an ideal son, an ideal brother, and an ideal husband, an ideal friend and an ideal king.

He was happy in adversity, calm in miseries, intrepid in dangers.




## Shri Rāma as a Loving Brother

Sita's decision.




#### Lord Rama as a Loving Husband

After Rama gets to know that Sita is kidnapped by Ravana, we get to see the emotional side of Rama.






#### Lord Rāma

His subjects loved him immensely.


He often used to say, "I will do anything and everything to please my subjects, and, if necessary I can even abandon my dear wife for their sake."


#### Let Sri Rama be our ideal.
